

Cadder Newsletter June



Dear Member and Friend of Cadder Church,

Have you ever been caught in a storm? I encountered a ferocious storm of the West Coast of Scotland when I was 16. I was working on a 40-foot fishing boat and we were sailing from Tobermory to Crinan and the storm did its best to capsize us, but by the grace of God, we made it to the port.

The hymn writer Augustus Toplady, was caught in a violent storm and he managed to find a safe place in a crevice in a rock, where he was inspired to write these words,

“Rock of Ages, cleft for me,

let me hide myself in thee;

let the water and the blood,

from thy wounded side which flowed,

be of sin the double cure;

cleanse me from its guilt and power.”

Today, we are facing a perfect storm within the Church of Scotland, with 40% reduction in the number of ministers by 2025, too many buildings in the wrong places, fewer entering the ministry, financial deficits, and membership plummeting. So, there is a storm above us and we are caught in it.

The last 15 months have been like a storm in itself, as the pandemic has caused chaos and has brought suffering to many throughout our world and is still doing so.

So, the question is, how do we survive the storms of life?

Well, the simple answer may be found in this beautiful story of Jesus calming the storm in Matthew 8v23-27.

Firstly, acknowledge that we are in a storm. This may seem obvious, but often we want to bury our heads in the sand rather than acknowledge that there is a problem; that accusation was put before the General Assembly this year, that we have not acted quickly and decisively enough in past years and now the future of the church is in peril. The disciples definitely knew that they were in a storm and it came suddenly and it was life threatening.

Secondly, realise that we are not in the storm alone. Seek help! This is what the disciples did. They woke Jesus up, who was asleep at the stern of the boat. “Lord save us, we are going to drown!” they cried out to him. Their words were short and earnest. “Lord save us!”

I would encourage us all to pray these words, for ourselves and for the future of our church both nationally and locally. Let us learn from the disciples and take this matter with urgency to God in prayer call on him, “Lord, save us, we are going to drown!”

Jesus rebuked the disciples, “Why are you so afraid, you of little faith!” These are challenging words; they were afraid simply because they were human beings, and their future was in danger.

Jesus calmly rebukes the storm. He faces the issue head on, and he is in control because he knew his Father’s loving care and he knew that his Father was still in control. So, he encourages the disciples to do the same and have faith in Him. To follow Christ is to know him in the sunshine and the storm.

What’s the message for us? Don’t allow yourself to get swamped with all the depressing news; yes, be aware of the storm, but let us look beyond the storm and trust that our Saviour has everything in hand.

Of course, that doesn't mean that we do nothing; we do our best in the storm, we persevere, we keep our balance, we keep direction and in the midst of the storm we keep our eyes fixed on the Eternal God believing that He has a plan for us.

Please remember that the Church was not thought up by a human committee, the Church is God’s idea. His Son is the head of the Church and His Spirit sustains the Church. So, the Church will never die; change it will, but it will never end.

When the storm passes, what will the church at Cadder look like in 10 years or even in 5 years’ time? I don’t know, but what I do know, is that God is in the storm with us, and if we remain close to God, then He will be close to us and He will work out his purpose for our lives.

The Church has been no stranger to storms in the past, as this old hymn points out,

“Will your anchor hold in the storms of life,

When the clouds unfold their wings of strife?

When the strong tides lift, and the cables strain,

Will your anchor drift or firm remain?

We have an anchor that keeps the soul

Stedfast and sure while the billows roll,

Fastened to the Rock which cannot move,

Grounded firm and deep in the Saviour's love.”
