A View from the Manse

Dear Friend,

December 20th, just five days before Christmas, I was suddenly inflicted with acute cholecystitis and admitted to the Royal Infirmary for intravenous antibiotics and pain killers – not what any minister or their congregations want of their minister, days before Christmas!

Thankfully, I was organized with all my services, and I had the support of Chris Gordon, our probationer minister, who was able to take over from me and lead our worship over Christmas.

But, in hospital over the next six days, God was to teach me many valuable lessons about faith. Once the pain subsided, I came across a film called Daniel on my laptop.

Many will remember the stories of Daniel and his friends from their Sunday School days; particularly his triumph over the hungry lions; his friends being thrown to the flames and surviving; well worth a read again!

Daniel was amongst many young Jews taken from their homeland and transported to Babylon in the 6th century BC. Babylon at this time was the most powerful nation in the world. In hostage Daniel held onto his faith but more important God held on to Daniel and his friends.

The film encouraged me to study the book of Daniel whilst recovering my health, and it spoke to me of how God works in the darkest of times.

I continually asked the question, what was it that kept Daniel and his friends shining?

Despite all the external things that had happened to them, they trusted that their Creator God, was still in control. They believed that their God was involved in human affairs; that he had put Babylon in control of their destiny, but ultimately God was in control of Babylon!

The book of Daniel reminds us that the God that we worship is a God who is at work and demonstrates his power over evil human intentions, again and again. A God that we see at work through the life of Jesus, who went to the cross to suffer and die for our sin. God is no stranger to suffering and he demonstrates this by overcoming evil on the cross.

The book of Daniel gives us hope for the present and the future! As we look around our world, we see the carnage that is caused by war in Gaza; we see the challenges that people face on a daily basis through natural disasters; we see suffering and grief all around us, and we can easily despair but Daniel continually reminds us that God is still in control and is with us.

Whatever challenges you have faced in your life or are presently facing; take encouragement from Daniel and his friends, and go on trusting that if you are called to go through dark times, like Daniel, your God will be with you, working out His plan for your life. As we approach Easter, and we embrace the lonely lent journey, and then the pain of Good Friday; we keep going, because we know that God has the last say through the resurrection of Jesus. This is our ultimate hope. God has triumphed – He is Risen!

Reminder to be vigilant of emails impersonating John

The Communications team is aware that some church members have recently received what appears to be an email from our minister, John, saying he is having trouble ordering from Amazon. Just to make you aware, this is an example of email phishing, where fraudsters find your email address, contact you and then try to gain your trust by impersonating someone you know. If you receive an email like this, please don't reply to it or click on any links within it. The best thing to do is to delete the email.

A good way to check if an email is genuine is to look at the email address behind the "From" name. The "From" name you see at the top of an email and the address it's really being sent from are often quite different if it's not genuine. If you hover over the "From" name or click on it then it should display who it really came from. John's emails should always come from jmacgregor@churchofscotland.org.uk

CADDER GROWTH PLAN

After a year of hard work by the Church Growth teams in 2023, we are now in our second year of Cadder Growth planning. A new plan for 2024 was approved at the Kirk Session in December 2023 comprising 12 Mission and Resources team plans. A full copy of the Growth Plan can be found on the Church website.

Here is an extract from the Minister's introduction to the new plan. It captures what we were trying to achieve through our Growth planning activities in 2023 and how we hope to keep the Growth journey going in 2024:

“That’s what our Cadder Growth Plan seeks to do, it gives us a structure to grow our Church. It puts mission and the Gospel of Jesus on the front foot, which is supported by resources. Our 2023 Growth Plan, was about putting down roots, building on the foundations of the 5 Marks of Mission. This we have done and we will continue to do. 2024’s plan will see those little buds and green shoots beginning to push their heads through the hard soil of winter. The plan encourages us to be optimistic, and to see that Spring time in our Church is coming; renewal and growth is but a prayer away. As we launch our Growth Plan for 2024, some of it will be familiar ground, some of it, new territory; let us go forward with courage and faith, not in our own strength but building and trusting in the mission of Jesus, living out the good news, and if we do so, we will see the buds in our Church beginning to blossom.”

On return to the church, we had a short service lead by Chris and checked out the wildlife havens we have around the church including many bug hotels, a few hedgehog homes, our bird and bat boxes.

Recently, we put up two new bird boxes at the Watch House kindly made and donated by Billy Gilchrist.



March is going to be a busy month for us as we get ready for the arrival of Spring.

On the 2nd of March, we are going along to the Nurture Group Chat and Play session to make bird feeders so we can help the birds gain strength after the winter to build nests, lay eggs and start their new families.

On Saturday 9th March Cadder Church is hosting a Climate Change Conference from 10.00 a.m. till 1.00 p.m. at the South Halls. This will be a joint meeting with the Church of Scotland, ECO Congregation, Christian Aid, The Guild and ourselves all participating.



We are anticipating attendance by a number of Glasgow Presbytery Churches, ECO Congregations and local churches.

The conference will include a keynote address by Church of Scotland and three workshops in which we can all hear much more about our individual and collective need to care for our planet and encourage others to join in the fight to reduce our carbon footprint for future generations.

Through the intimations we will be seeking members of the congregation to volunteer to help manage this event on the day.

On Saturday 23rd March, we will be holding our Earth Day Service at the church from 8.30 p.m. and 9.30 p.m. We ask people to switch off all energy consumption in their own house and walk down to the church or park at the North Hall and come down to join us if they can, suitably clothed and bringing a torch. Last year proved a very moving and atmospheric experience for those who came along.

This year on the last Sunday of each month, we are encouraging members to walk to church or to park elsewhere and walk if they are able and thus we can all reduce our carbon footprint. The first in March falls on Easter Sunday 31st March.

We are also looking to commence a “Pride in our Environment” event where we can organise a litter pick regularly around the church and canal areas. More details will be issued through the Intimations.

We also encourage you to continue to use the Recycling Boxes at the church and South Hall for Ink Cartridges, Spectacles and Mobile Phones.

We will again be distributing wildflower seeds to the youth organisations and members for planting in their gardens or pots to encourage butterflies, bees and insects to continue to flourish.

Open meetings will be starting up again shortly where some interesting topics will be up for discussion.

Christian Aid Week 2024



This year Christian Aid Week falls between 12 - 18 May. There will be a number of events which will be organised and advertised nearer the time, but in the meantime, please keep the date in your diary!

MISS MARGARET YOUNG

We were all saddened to hear of the recent passing of Margaret Young.

Margaret was one of East Dunbartonshire's oldest residents, and died just a few weeks short of her 104th birthday.

She was born on 14 February 1920 in Rothesay and came to live in Bishopbriggs when she was seven. The family home was the 'white house' beside the Eagle Lodge. When her father retired from Blackie's publishers the family moved to Hilton Terrace and then to Springfield Crescent which remained her home and where she continued to live independently until just after her 100th birthday.

Margaret attended school in Bishopbriggs in what is now the library, but as this only provided secondary schooling until third year, and with Bishopbriggs at that time being in Lanarkshire, she had to travel to Coatbridge for the remainder of her education. On leaving school she took a secretarial course at college. The war interrupted her career and in 1942 she joined the A.T.S. in The Royal Corps of Signals, training at Newcastle before being dispatched to the south coast. She presumed this would be secretarial work in an office, but she was sent to the gun operations room and recalled many stories of her time there, often not being able to leave when her shift was finished as bombs were flying overhead.

She also spent a short time at Ardgowan House in Inverkip. It was a bone of contention that despite their war service these women never received medals. A discussion just six years ago with a poppy seller resulted in her applying and it was with pride that she wore her long overdue medal.

In 1946 Margaret was demobbed and returned to secretarial work in Glasgow before being transferred to the firm's London office in 1953. On a visit home to see her parents in 1956 she had a chance meeting with George Wright of Keir and Cawder in Bishopbriggs who wanted to know why she chose to go away to work in London - her reply was, "The pay was double what I could get here." She obviously impressed him and he said if she ever came back home to contact him, which she did a month later. She was eventually employed as his personal secretary at the same rate she got in London and remained there until she retired.

Margaret was a keen tennis and badminton player and was Lady Captain of Cawder Golf Club in Bishopbriggs in 1974. At the age of 75 she decided to take up bowling and joined Kirkintilloch Bowling Club where she remained an active member until recently.

Faith played a large part in Margaret's life and she regularly walked along the canal to Cadder Church. She became an Elder here in 1990 and right up until turning 100 she was still welcoming people at the door and uplifting the offering. She joined the Cadder Guild and was Secretary, then President in 1996, and continued to attend regularly, participating in the meetings and happily providing home baking when required.

Paying tribute to Margaret, Rev. John MacGregor said,

“Margaret was an inspiration, a wise person filled with grace and humility, who lived life in the fullest sense of the word. She was a tonic to visit, a positive and resilient person, someone who always had a smile. Margaret was the first person I visited when I arrived at Cadder Church seven years ago. She was in hospital, but rallied from her illness at that time; she loved life and was a faithful Guild member. We trust that she knows the fullness of God’s mercy and love and that her youthful spirit is renewed again.”

Margaret passed away peacefully at Stobhill Care Home on 25 January.

She was laid to rest on 13 February, the day before what would have been her 104th birthday.

Young in name and **young** in spirit: a remarkable lady and an example of a life lived to the full.

Ruth Box is coming on February the 15th. to tell us about the Chocolate Pioneers which is the last of this cycle of projects which the Guild supports.

Our Fund Raiser for the projects is again Taylor Fashions on the 29th February. Then in March it is our AGM starting with Fish and Chips. Our last meeting of this Session is our Daffodil Tea on March 21st. when our friends from Fairlie hope to joins us. Entertainment is by John Campbell-Title- Fun, Music and Magic.

Just to let you know mum has now moved to Buchanan House Care Home, Bearsden.

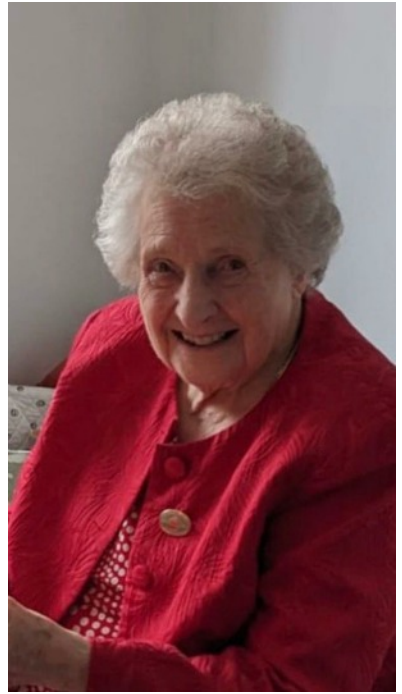

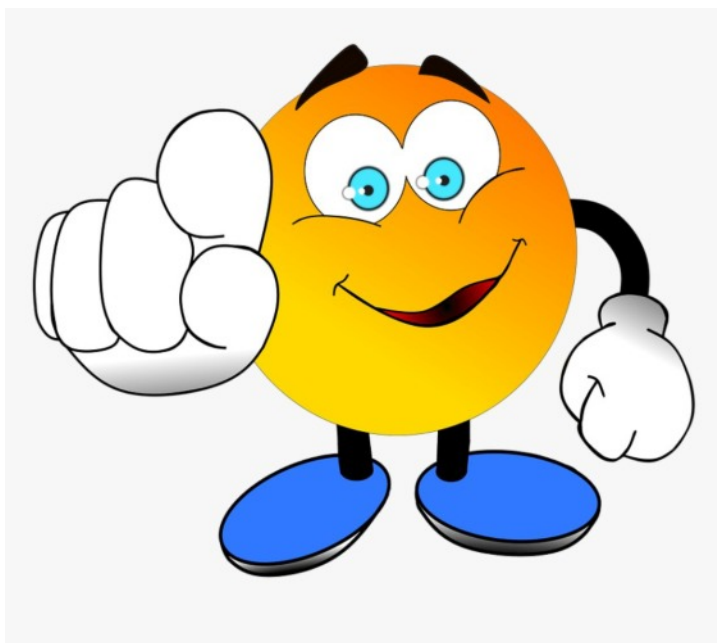
